community colleges to have more of workforce development focus. There will be a presentation on community college workforce certificate productivity to highlight both credit and non -credit progra ms and will include a high level discussion by the Board for future opportunities for noncredit programs. This is an area the BOR has not explored in great detail, she was hoping to generate some policy support from that discussion.

With the change in the direction of the Community College Committee, the BOR will be looking at the IAC guidelines and policies . Vice Chancellor Abba recently met with the IAC Chairs to start a dialogue on how t o better craft a statement that gives the Presidents more discretion on how they use their IACs. All the institutions are utilizing their IAC's d ifferently. Vice Chancellor Abba will meet with the presidents indivually once the document has been drafted, then circle back to the IAC Chairs. She would share the document at an upcoming meeting. The Dual Enrollment Task Force concluded their work , the final report has been written and will be available the first week in December . The BOR Academic and Research Student Affairs ( ARSA) Committee will consider the recommendation on price at the ir December meeting. This would create uniform pricing within NSHE for dual enrollment at any institution.

Ms. Wilson and Ms. Christensen gave a PowerPoint presentation and led the IAC through an activity to answer a series questions designed to ho ne in on the key insights from the IAC relate d to the community, the Council Members' industries, and the relationship between the IAC and TMCC.

During the presentation there was some discussion about including transfer students, those seeking AA degrees, in the statistics provided as they reflected a large portion of TMCC students. There was concern that some programs might be getting overlooked or have skewed representation based on the way the data was being collected and summarized. The IAC provided s uggestions on other data points to consider to better reflect student outcomes, industry need, define the workforce categories for more accurate recordation and track students once they complete a degree.

a) IAC Council Member Take-Away

Council Member Nannini said this meeting was the perfect example of why th e IAC is so important, hearing about the workforce efforts across all the sectors at TMCC was so valuable. This information assists him in his job at the university.

Council Member Commuri said in the future placement history would be valuable. There's contradictory information about there being a lack of qualified workers, yet he's seeing many students returning as they are not able to find a job. It is important to know what's wo rking and what's not working from a planning standpoint.

Council Member Estipona said COVID effects have transformed all the industries discussed the CLNA discussion. Many companies that had been overseas are now looking to transition back to the US. In his own personal experience, he was seeing that jobs in the areas of digital and technical work, some of may be better suited for certifications instead of a two or four year degree as they change so quickly. The i ndustry is moving faster than what education can keep up with.
